



CDC Funding Gaps in the South Advocacy Toolkit: Georgia

The Problem

Georgia ranked 10th in the country in the number of deaths among people living with HIV in 2013.¹

The number of men in GA who acquired HIV via male-to-male sexual contact increased by 42% from 16,986 men in 2008 to 24,101 men in 2013.1

Georgia ranked 5th in the country in the number of people living with HIV in 2013 with 42,067 individuals.¹

Georgia ranked <u>5th the country</u> in the number of <u>HIV diagnoses</u>, reporting 2,247 cases in 2014.¹

CDC Funding Inequities


- Community based organizations are especially qualified to provide HIV testing and other prevention services for hard-to-reach communities.
- Community-based organizations <u>outside</u> of the Atlanta metropolitan area were <u>completely left out</u> in recent HIV prevention funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).² (Grant No. PS15-1502)
- Community based organizations in <u>Macon</u>, <u>Savannah</u>, <u>Columbus</u>, <u>Augusta</u> etc. were <u>not</u> eligible for funding under PS15 -1502.²
- 33.1% of people living with HIV in GA live outside the only city eligible for funding.³
- An estimated <u>37.6% of all new HIV diagnoses</u> in GA in 2013 were from areas left out of funding.³

- 2. Community-based organization prevention dollars that are distributed consistent with the geographic distribution of the HIV epidemic.
- 3. Grants should include the opportunity to get technical assistance for smaller community-based organizations.
