



# CDC Funding Gaps in the South Advocacy Toolkit: Mississippi

### The Problem

The Deep South, including Mississippi, has the <u>highest death rates</u> from HIV of any US region.<sup>1</sup>

Mississippi ranked 8<sup>th</sup> in the country in the rate of new HIV diagnoses in 2014.<sup>3</sup>

The South, including Mississippi, has the <u>lowest survival rates</u> after a diagnosis of HIV/AIDS than any other US region.<sup>2</sup>

Mississippi ranked 9<sup>th</sup> in the country in the rate of people living with HIV in 2013.<sup>3</sup>

### **CDC Funding Inequities**


- Community-based organizations (CBOs) are especially qualified to provide HIV testing and other prevention services for hard-to-reach communities.
- Community-based organizations <u>outside</u> of the Jackson metropolitan area were <u>completely left out</u> in recent HIV prevention funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). (Grant No. PS15-1502)
- 64% of all new HIV diagnoses in MS in 2013 were in areas left out of funding.4
- 57% of people living with HIV in MS in 2013 live in areas ineligible for funding.<sup>4</sup>
- Despite its high rates of new HIV diagnoses and of people living with diagnosed HIV throughout the state, only one Mississippi-based CBO (in Jackson) received funding pursuant to PS15-1502.<sup>4</sup>
