HIV IN TEXAS, BY THE NUMBERS¹



81,873: the number of Texans living with diagnosed HIV/AIDS in 2015.



83.0% of newly diagnosed individuals in 2016 were male.



3rd in the nation: for number of new HIV diagnoses in 2016.



60.9% of individuals diagnosed in 2016 were between age 13 and 34.



DEPENDS ON RYAN WHITE:2

- An estimated 42,553 Texans received services through Ryan White in 2015.
- 67.6% were living at or below the poverty line.
- Since Ryan White is legally required to be the "payer of last resort," these people did not have other access to medical or support services.

Federal Ryan White Funding in TX³


Part A: \$54.77M

Part B: \$114.48M

Part C: \$7.30M

Part D: \$5.48M

Part F: \$0.05M



Texas received \$182 million in federal Ryan White funds in 2017:4

- \$87.44 million went to ADAP.
- \$54.77 went to Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio, the state's only cities eligible for Part A funding for urban areas. As a result, Part B funding (for states) is particularly important in Texas.

Ryan White services keep HIV-positive individuals in treatment and care




With treatment, people with HIV can live active, healthy lives.



People whose virus is suppressed for 6 months cannot transmit HIV through sex.





But, if disconnected from care, resistance to medications can develop making it easier to transmit HIV.

Moreover, without treatment HIV is deadly. 5

RYAN WHITE PROVIDES SERVICES ACROSS THE HIV CARE CONTINUUM

HIV CARE CONTINUUM:

THE SERIES OF STEPS A PERSON WITH HIV TAKES FROM INITIAL DIAGNOSIS THROUGH THEIR SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT WITH HIV MEDICATION



While only **58**% of people nationwide have a viral load that is effectively suppressed as of 2014,⁶

of HIV-positive clients who had received at least one Ryan White funded medical care visit have achieved viral suppression.

WITHOUT MEDICAID EXPANSION, TEXAS RELIES ON RYAN WHITE MORE THAN OTHER STATES.

Ryan White program clients living with HIV in Texas had no insurance coverage other than Ryan White in 2015.8

No other program provides the same set of gap-filling services or care as Ryan White. Even after health reform, Ryan White remains crucial for Texas.
