# HIV IN ALABAMA, BY THE NUMBERS<sup>1</sup>



12,643: the number of Alabamans living with diagnosed HIV in 2016.



11th in the nation: in HIV diagnosis rates in 2017.



**9th in the nation:** in HIV death rates in 2016.



**19th in the nation:** in HIV prevalence rates in 2016.



- An estimated 9,046 Alabamans received Ryan White services in
- 2015.
- 73% were living at or below the poverty line.
- Since Ryan White is legally required to be the "payer of last
- resort," these people did not have other access to medical or support
- services.



### Alabama received \$38.5 million in Ryan White funds in 2018

- \$10.59 million went to the AIDS Drug Assistance Program(ADAP).
- Over the past five years, Ryan White funding has increased by 22%.
- The **Ending HIV Epidemic: Plan for America** would increase funding to Alabama because the state has a substantial rural HIV burden.

#### Ryan White services keep HIV-positive individuals in treatment and care



With treatment, people with HIV can live active, healthy lives.



People whose virus is suppressed for 6 months cannot transmit HIV through sex.





But, if disconnected from care, resistance to medications can develop making it easier to transmit HIV. Moreover, without treatment HIV is deadly.<sup>5</sup>

RYAN WHITE PROVIDES SERVICES ACROSS THE HIV CARE CONTINUUM

#### **HIV CARE CONTINUUM:**

THE SERIES OF STEPS A PERSON WITH HIV TAKES FROM INITIAL DIAGNOSIS THROUGH THEIR SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT WITH **HIV MEDICATION** 



While only 60% of people nationwide have a viral load that is effectively suppressed as of 2015,

85.9% of HIV-positive clients who had received at least achieved viral suppression.

> WITHOUT MEDICAID EXPANSION, ALABAMA RELIES ON RYAN WHITE MORE THAN OTHER STATES.

Ryan White program clients with HIV in Alabama were uninsured in 2015.<sup>8</sup>

No other program provides the same set of gap-filling services or care as Ryan White. Even after health reform, Ryan White remains crucial for Alabama.
